

# Courses the Include Diversity-Related Content

## Westmont College 2009-2010

At Westmont, the faculty are intentional in seeking to make the curriculum more inclusive of a range of issues related to diversity. In doing this, they have for the most part, embedded these issues within the context of existing courses. The positive side of this approach is that diversity issues are studied as part of mainstream disciplinary concerns, rather than as a set of isolated issues. The negative side of this approach is that diversity concerns can seem invisible within the curriculum. In order to make some of these courses more “visible,” we provide students with a list of courses that faculty have identified as dealing with topics related to ethnic, gender, socio-economic, or religious diversity issues.
