CREDIT LIMITATION: A maximum of 8 units of PE activities may be applied to the Westmont degree.

If this limit is reached before the 4 activity courses have been taken, no further activity courses will be required.

Approved courses satisfy the **III. Common Skills, D. Physical Education G.E. requirement.**

Footnotes:

Three Writing-Intensive or Speech-Intensive Courses are required.

a) Writing for the Liberal Arts: Many students will fulfill the requirement by taking ENGL 1A.

b) Students with qualifying test scores (e.g., ACT, SAT WR) may fulfill the Writing for the Liberal Arts requirement by taking a writing-intensive course offered by any department. See Westmont catalog for qualifying scores.

c) Students are required to take at least one writing-intensive or speech-intensive course in their major and one course outside their major.
