CREDIT LIMITATION: A maximum of 8 units of PE activities may be applied to the Westmont degree.
If this limit is reached before the 4 activity courses have been taken, no further activity courses will be required.
Approved courses satisfy the **III. Common Skills, D. Physical Education G.E. requirement.**

Footnotes:

Three Writing-Intensive or Speech-Intensive Courses are required.

- a) Writing for the Liberal Arts: Many students will fulfill the requirement by taking ENGL V01A.
- b) Students with qualifying test scores (e.g., ACT, SAT WR) may fulfill the Writing for the Liberal Arts requirement by taking a writing-intensive course offered by any department. See Westmont catalog for qualifying scores.
- c) Students are required to take at least one writing-intensive or speech-intensive course in their major and one course outside their major.
