I. Response to the previous year PRC's recommendations

Item: Review and if necessary restructure the curriculum to reflect the strengths of the department's faculty, serve the needs of its students, and increase student interest in the Political Science major.	Response: We waited on a full curriculum review until we hired a full-time replacement for Susan Penksa. Now that we've hired Kate Bryant, we will conduct a full review of the curriculum over the next several years, according to our Program Review Action Plan.
Item: Ensure that Dr. Covington's benefit to the Augustinian Scholars Program and Dr. Knecht's benefit to Westmont Golf are carefully balanced against their value to students in the Political Science.	Response: This is an on-going discussion.
Item: Address student concerns related to scheduling, possibly by the use of a four-year course schedule and individual student four-year course schedules.	Response: As with the first recommendation, we will consider these concerns as part of our full curriculum review, per the schedule of our Action Plan.
Item: Strengthen career advising, possibly by alumni engagement in responding to requests for career advice.	Response: We have increasingly partnered alumni with current students through a mentoring program and informational interviews. We also had been working with the Office of Career Development and Calling to host a career event this spring. However, our plan for this was disrupted due to the COVID-19 crisis and the removal from campus activities.

1. It is worth noting that these recommendations from the PRC are in response to our six-year report and thus have implications for the next several years, not just for this year.

2. During the Department's presentation in Academic Senate this spring, it was suggested that the Department revise our program review plans in order to devote a year's efforts to curriculum review *instead of* (rather than in addition to) one year's annual assessment of one of our learning outcomes. The Department discussed this plan and decided to pursue it. A revised Action Plan is attached.

<u>Direct</u>	We usually conduct a direct assessment of active social engagement through papers in POL 190. However, due to the low

<u>Methods</u>	enough sample to justify this method. Therefore, we moved to an indirect assessment of this PLO in the Spring of 2020.

Major	Appendix A provides the codebook for our survey. Appendix B compares the results from Political Science students to a
Findings	national survey of 18-24 year-olds (PRRI) and all Americans (ANES). Overall, Westmont Political Science majors compare
	very favorably with other Americans. Our majors are more likely to vote (61% compared to 47% of 18-24 year olds), sign
	an online petition (74% to 44%); attend a rally or demonstration (52% to 8%); volunteer for a group or cause (43% to
	14%); and post on social media about an issue of importance (56% to 23%). Our majors also reported a greater sense of
	political efficacy than the general public. Students were asked to evaluate two statements: 1) Sometimes politics and
	government seem so complicated that a person like me can't really understand what's going on. 2) People like me don't
	have any say about what the government does. For Q1, 55% of Political Science majors disagreed compared to 29% of all
	Americans. For Q2, 53% of Political Science majors disagreed compared to 36% of all Americans. Our majors believe that
	God calls to participate in politics (85%) and volunteer in the community (100%).

	Despite overwhelming evidence that our majors are socially engaged, there are two issues that deserve the Department's				
	attention. First, students gave the Department a lackluster rating on how much we stress the importance of civic and				
	social engagement: 23% said we stress social engagement "a great deal"; 32% said "quite a bit"; 41% somewhat; and 5%				
	said "not very much." Second, although a majority of our students have taken a service learning course, only 33% took				
	one through the major. We hope to both emphasize the importance of civic engagement and offer more service learning				
	courses in the future.
